March was an exciting and productive month filled with successful programs, professional development, and behind-thescenes work to improve our department.

Children's Programming Highlights

Our large weekend family program was a hit! We transformed the Children's Department into a carnival, complete with games, prizes, and snacks. With the help of staff and our amazing Teen Advisory Board volunteers, we welcomed approximately 60 attendees for two hours of fun.

Family Bingo also saw record attendance, reaching full capacity to the point where we had to turn families away due to space constraints. To accommodate the growing interest, we plan to expand seating into the Activity Room—a great sign of how much this program is resonating with the community!

On March 21st, we hosted our highly anticipated **Nerf Wars** event after hours, turning the Children's Department into a target practice zone and transforming the Adult Department into a Battle Zone with dimmed lights, disco lights, music, and plenty of action. Kids (and even some parents!) played for two hours straight, and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. Parents have already asked when the next battle will be!

Indiana Library Federation Youth Services Conference

Thank you for the opportunity to attend the **Youth Services Conference**. It was a whirlwind trip, packed with educational sessions that will help us enhance programming and collection development at WPL. Some key takeaways include:

- Strategies to foster teen engagement through role-playing games and other creative initiatives
- New STEAM programming ideas
- Best practices for managing material challenges
- Effective ways to reach and engage families

Additionally, we took time to visit Monroe County Public Library before heading home to explore their youth and teen spaces and had the privilege of meeting with their youth director – something that was not part of the conference, but I felt would be beneficial. We sat down and discussed shared challenges and exchanged ideas, forming a valuable professional connection that I plan to continue.

Teen Advisory Board (TAB)

This group continues to impress and inspire me. In March, we celebrated birthdays (with cake, of course!), brainstormed future teen displays and volunteer opportunities, and played games of luck. A volunteer has stepped up to play the Easter Bunny for our annual **Easter Eggstravaganza & Pictures with the Easter Bunny**, and another group is eager to organize an **Improv Class** for their peers.

TAB is more than just a teen program—it's a safe space for many of these young people, some of whom don't feel at home anywhere else. At our last meeting, one teen pulled me aside to thank me for the birthday cake, mentioning that it would be their only celebration this year. Others expressed concerns about potential library funding cuts, sharing that library programming is essential for their socialization and well-being. These teens are invested in the library's future, and their passion reinforces why the work we do matters. They aren't just attending programs—they're becoming lifelong library supporters.

Salary Request

As I near the completion of my **Master of Library and Information Science** this May, I have submitted a formal request for a salary increase, attached to this report. I appreciate your time in reviewing my request and considering how my continued professional growth will benefit the library, especially as we navigate the current challenges facing libraries.

"When I was little, there would be very lonely summer days. Both of my parents worked and, both siblings being older than I, I was left to my own devices. The library was right across the street!
